As I reflect on the past year with Common Ground Cafe,

I am filled with immense pride and gratitude for the remarkable progress we have made in addressing food insecurity among seniors in Cleveland County, NC. What began as a negative and scary medical experience with my father last year has been beautifully transformed into a wonderful program that has blessed many seniors. Since launching the iSMILE Meal Delivery Program for Seniors in June 2023, our dedicated team has worked tirelessly to establish a productive system and expand our reach and impact.

Starting with just 18 seniors in two apartment complexes, we now deliver nutritious meals to 90 seniors across four senior apartment complexes and various homes throughout the county. This growth is a testament to our Cleveland County's unwavering support and the hard work of our board members, volunteers and partners.

Our mission to provide culturally sensitive meals tailored to the unique dietary needs of each senior has set us apart from other meal programs. We take great care in understanding the food preferences, allergies, dental issues, and medical conditions of our participants, ensuring that each meal is both nutritious and enjoyable. This personalized approach not only addresses immediate hunger but also contributes to the overall health and well-being of the seniors we serve.

We owe our success to the favor of God, and to the generous support of our grantors. Resourceful Communities was the first organization to believe in the potential of the iSMILE Meal Program for Seniors, even when it was just an idea. Their initial support laid the foundation for our program. We are also deeply grateful to the Hospice Foundation, the Dover Foundation, the Albermarle Foundation, Two Kings Casino, and Albermarle Foundation whose contributions have been instrumental in bringing our vision to life and sustaining our efforts.

Our partnerships with Christ Covenant Ministries, Washington Outreach Ministries and Shelby Mission Camp have been invaluable, as our program would be impossible without the ability to have a safe and equipped kitchen to use as a home-base for our meal preparation. We are appreciative of your trust in us with the use of your church and facility.

Boiling Springs Community Garden, Foothills Farmers Market and Case Farms have been instrumental in providing fresh, locally-sourced food items that helped us provide nutritious meals to our wonderful seniors.

I would be remiss if I did not take the time to acknowledge our iSMILE team and volunteers that give of their time and skills faithfully each week to provide the excellent service our seniors have grown to love. Thank you Dena, Melody, Jericka, Sharon, Evelyn, JoAnn, Laura, Charlotte, Ebony, Edna, Rhonda, Lateefah, and Monique. We also appreciate Deborah, Debbie and Josephine, who were instrumental to helping us lay the foundation of this invaluable services to our seniors.

COMMON GROUND CAFE OVERVIEW

HISTORY

Common Ground Café was established in March 2018 by Nancy Hillman and her late husband Robert. Their vision was modeled after the national community café restaurant model established by Denise Cerreta, founder and former president of the One World Everybody Eats nonprofit organization. For six years, the executive director, board members, and volunteers at Common Ground Café have built strong community relationships with local farmers, gardeners, restaurant owners, caterers, culinary artists, churches, and area businesses. Working with these partnerships, Common Ground Café can provide nutritious meals in a welcoming and safe environment, allowing participants to dine with dignity regardless of income, age, or status. Common Ground Café values education, provision, volunteerism, and community activism, all aimed at reducing food insecurity in our community. Our primary program prepares and delivers meals to marginalized and underserved seniors through the iSMILE Meal Delivery Program for Seniors.


VISION

To build a healthy and inclusive community by providing high quality meals primarily produced from local sources and served in a welcoming atmosphere where everyone eats with dignity, regardless of income, age, or status.

MISSION

Common Ground Café exists to strengthen our community, improve our economy, foster local partnerships, educate others, and address food insecurity by promoting health and offering nourishing meals in a welcoming and safe environment to everyone regardless of income, age, or status. The **iSMILE Meal Delivery Program for Seniors** originated from a medical situation with Common Ground Café's Executive Director's 94-year-old father, Mr. Isaac (pictured on right). Thankfully Mr. Isaac recovered; however, his medical scare was the catalyst for Common Ground Café to develop a meal delivery program for underserved and marginalized seniors that would not only seek to provide hot nourishing meals, but also reduce food waste, decrease feelings of isolation, improve socialization and positively impact the community economics.

The i.SMILE Meal Program for Seniors has two main objectives. (1) to address the health, social, economic, and environmental needs of those elderly citizens who are physically, cognitively, or emotionally unable to prepare or cook meals on their own, and whose income falls at or below the Federal Poverty Limit. And (2) to reduce isolation and create a sense of community by providing meals and social interaction to enhance the quality of life for our elders. There are also 5 Core Values that the program seeks to reflect in the service:



5.Love Volunteers or staff

PROGRAM OVERVIEW



The iSMILE Meal Delivery Program for Seniors began in June 2023 with 18 marginalized and underserved African American seniors, over the age of 70, below the federal poverty rate, and who were unable to consistently prepare meals on their own. The individuals were residents within two apartment complexes, with some participants unable to drive, physically unable to leave their home, and some without any family support.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

In June 2023 the program began with cooking and delivering weekly culturallysensitive meals to 18 marginalized and underserved seniors within two senior apartment complexes in **Cleveland County. In October** 2023 the number of participants was increased to 64 and two delivery routes were added. Currently, the **iSMILE** program provides weekly meal deliveries to 90 seniors throughout Cleveland County, with 10 referrals waiting to be added to the program.

From June 2023 - July 2024, the iSMILE team members have prepared and delivered over 3400 meals to underserved and marginalized seniors

Approximately 200 pounds of produce has been donated from gardners the Boiling Springs Community Garden, the Foothills Farmers Market and the Shelby Mission Camp (which results in an approximate food donation value of \$350)

During the initial 3-month pilot service period of the iSMILE Meal Delivery Program in June 2023, priority for program entry was given to African American adults, ages 70 and above, who were at or below the Federal Poverty Level, and unable to consistently prepare or cook meals on their own. September 2023, the apartment manager advised there were several individuals in high need that were under 70 and/or identified with another ethnicity. For that reason, the age was lowered to 62 and we eliminated all racial considerations. As of August 2024, we serve 90 seniors in the program, and the demographics of the participants include African American, White, and Hispanic, ranging from age 64-94 with two of the participants classified as legally blind.

> Each of the Lead Cooks are trained and certified with a Serv-Safe Manager Certificate to ensure that all safety and sanitation guidelines are met during the meal preparation and delivery process.

From June 2023 - July 2024, volunteers provided approximately 1720 hours of service, which resulted in a savings of \$54,696 at a volunteer value rate of \$31.80/hour.

2023-2024 CORPORATE PROGRAM SUPPORTERS





In 2023, Common Ground Cafe began the year with an anticipated budget of \$25,000. We are grateful to report that our income exceeded expectations, totaling \$41,700, which enabled us to initiate the service of addressing food insecurity among seniors in Cleveland County through our iSMILE Meal Delivery Service for Seniors.

Our expenses for the year amounted to \$32,000, reflecting our commitment to fiscal responsibility and efficient resource management. The surplus of \$9,700 was used to further support and expand our iSMILE Senior Meal Program into the 2024 program year.

\$37,600 of the income received were from corporate grants: The Resourceful Communities (\$10,900), Hospice Foundation (\$5,000), Dover Foundation (\$5,700) and Albemarle Foundation (\$10,000) grants were restricted to the iSMILE Senior Meal Program. The remaining two grants from Catawba Two Kings Casino (\$5,000) and a second grant from Hospice Foundation (\$1,000) were unrestricted. Each of these grants played a crucial role in the development of a much needed service to deliver nutritious meals to seniors who are unable to prepare meals on their own and support the low overhead operational expenses.

In addition to the tremendous help received from the grants, our program success would not have been possible without the steadfast support of our board members, donors, volunteers, and community partners. Their generosity and commitment empower us to make a meaningful difference in the lives of seniors facing food insecurity, and we look forward to building on this momentum in the year ahead.


COMMON CROUND CAFE FUTURE OUTLOOK
